
Ask the Doctors - A Question and Answer Forum

Dr. A. Ogunyemi, Epileptologist


and

o you Tweet? Nearly everyone I know does it. Twitter is huge, and I will confess that I do have an account there, but for me it's never been that big of a draw. Reading the random thoughts of friends and celebrities in small 140 character sentences seems so shallow, and so detached.

Perhaps that's why we find so much negativity on places like Twitter, Facebook, chat rooms, and blogs all over the internet - because of the detachment. Not to mention the anonymity. It seems people can say any hurtful thing they want these days as long as they are behind the security of their computer monitor.

Recently on the Health Day website I read this:

In a study published in the February issue of Epilepsy and Behavior, Canadian researchers analyzed nearly 11,000 seizure-related "tweets" and deemed 41 percent of them as offensive. The study authors pointed out that the messages on this social networking service could reinforce negative perceptions of the neurological disorder.

41% of the tweets about epilepsy were offensive. That number floored me.

It's time we all stepped up against this sort of negativity. No matter if you are on Facebook, Twitter, or in line at the grocery store, if someone is making insulting or derogatory comments, say something.

We don't need to be confrontational about it, but by offering the truth of epilepsy, what life is really like with seizures, we can begin to change attitudes.

Residential Energy Efficiency Program

ewfoundland and Labrador Housing Corp. (NLHC) is now accepting applications for the Residential Energy Efficiency Program. The program is designed to assist as many as 1,000 homeowners with low incomes carry out retrofits to their homes for improved energy savings this year.

"The Residential Energy Efficiency Program has had excellent results with respect to improving energy efficiency of houses," said Tom Hedderson, minister responsible for NLHC. "This program is one of several that make it possible for homeowners with low incomes to upgrade their homes, in ways that make them more affordable in the long term."

Assistance will be available in the form of a grant of up to \$3,000 per household on the island and up to \$4,000 per household in Labrador. NLHC will provide funding for energy audits at the homes of successful applicants by an independent energy advisor.

The province allocated an additional \$12 million in its 2011 budget to extend this program for three years. Applications will be processed in the order in which they are received to a maximum of 1,000 applications each year.



Homeowners whose annual household income is \$32,500 or less are eligible to apply.

The program was run as a pilot project for two years. During this period, about \$7 million in grants enabled 2,000 homeowners to make retrofits. The province says this resulted in an average household

energy savings of 35 per cent and cash savings of nearly \$800 a year.

Added Safety for Those Who Live Alone

ost of us at some point over the years have seen, or at least heard of, personal alarms that can contact emergency services at the push of a button in case of a medical crisis. These devices can be excellent for people living alone who might need help but be unable to get to the phone.

However, it's hard to push a button when you're in the midst of a seizure.

Enter the **Philips Lifeline** with **Auto Alert** option.

This new bit of technology that goes one step beyond most personal alarms and

most personal alarms and adds something that's been lacking for people with epilepsy - the ability to call for help even if you are unconscious.



From their website:

AutoAlert offers all the benefits of our Standard Lifeline Medical Alert Service - push the button for help at any time - plus an added layer of protection: Lifeline with AutoAlert is the only pendant-style help button that can automatically place a call for help if it detects a fall and you're unable to push the button yourself.


How cool is that?!

The service is a subscription service, meaning that there is a monthly fee, but for people prone to convulsive seizures, it could mean that added reassurance that help is never far away.

New Adult Dental Program Announced

he provincial government's new adult dental program, which will provide enhanced diagnostic and therapeutic dental services to about 98,000 adults, became effective Jan. 1, 2012.



Health Minister Susan Sullivan says dental health is often linked to a person's physical and mental well-being and now the expansion of the province's dental health plan will ensure that more residents, who have difficulty availing of regular dental services, will have the ability to access proper dental care.

The new program includes examinations, extractions and fillings, as well as dentures.

The program will be available to clients who are enrolled in Newfoundland and Labrador Prescription Drug Programs.

Joan Burke, minister of advanced education and skills and lead minister for the poverty reduction strategy, said the adult dental program is a key example of a poverty reduction strategy initiative that will significantly improve the quality of life for people in vulnerable circumstances.

"This investment directly responds to requests received during our poverty reduction consultations, and will further our fight against poverty to help ensure all citizens have an opportunity to succeed and prosper," Burke said.

Information packages on the new adult dental program have been sent to all dentists and denturists in the province. The provincial government says it continues to work to address the current fee guide for dentures.

Clients who choose a provider who has not yet been registered under the plan may have to pay up front for their eligible services and then be reimbursed, at the province's approved rates.

"We recognize this may place a burden on some individuals," said Sullivan. "However, our government is working toward providing a solution that will hopefully see all providers participating in and billing the plan directly in the near future."

ach year ENL offers scholarships to post secondary students
 with epilepsy to assist them with continuing their education
 and pursuing their dreams.

The Zach Rowe Memorial Scholarship

The Zach Rowe Memorial Scholarship, valued at \$1000 is awarded to a student with epilepsy who will be continuing on to Post Secondary studies after High School. It honours Zach Rowe, recipient of the ENL scholarship in 2006, who passed away as a result of his seizures in 2009. Because of fundraising efforts of Zach's family and friends, this year we were able to offer Zach Rowe Memorial Scholarships to two very deserving students.

This year's fist recipient is **Luke Noftall** of St. John's. Luke is currently studying at Memorial University hoping to pursue some branch of therapy. Since his epilepsy diagnosis in 2005, it's been a roller coaster ride for Luke and his family; one that included multiple types of seizures, brain surgery, and an outpouring of support from everyone who knew him.

Before my first seizure, I was a good student with a great social life. I was a competitive swimmer and played on my school soccer and volleyball teams. [After my diagnosis] my doctor tried many medications, but I continued to have seizures and side effects from all the medications. I started failing academically, I

was forced to give up all my sports, and I lost most of my friends. In January of 2008 I travelled to Sick Kids Hospital in Toronto where I underwent a major brain resection. I had three brain surgeries in five days. After the surgeries, my seizures continued. I spent months working with therapists, and had to repeat Grade 10. I worked hard and things slowly improved. I am happy to say that I continue to improve and am now two and a half years seizure-free.

This year's second recipient of the Zach Rowe Memorial Scholarship is Allison King of Victoria. Allison is attending the College of the North Atlantic in Carbonear. Allision was diagnosed with Epilepsy at age 12, and says it has had a significant effect on her teen-age years. Like far too many people with Epilepsy, Allison was bullied by others who had no true understanding of what seizures were all about. She also felt restricted in what she could do, and avoided sporting activities as a result of her seizures.

Allison has a personal connection with the Rowe family. As the scholarships were awarded, we learned that Allison's brother and Zach had been very close friends. With Allison now being awarded a scholarship as Zach did in 2006, the moment was made even more touching.

We also awarded our annual **Jim Hierlihy Memorial Scholarship**, which is valued at \$1000. This honours a mature student with epilepsy who has taken the initiative to return to studies to advance in their present job or train for a new career.

This year's recipient is **Mona Earle** of St. John's. Mona is currently studying Geomatics Engineering at College of the North Atlantic with the goal to become a surveyor or hydrographer. Despite being diagnosed with Epilepsy in 1993, Mona is involved in numerous volunteer and charitable activities focusing on construction and re-development, both here at home, as well as in New Orleans.

I was diagnosed with epilepsy when I was 13. It was a difficult time for me. I was young and scared. Having a seizure always terrified me. I felt that there was this power inside of me thatI wasn't in control of; that my body could become hijacked at any time and there was nothing I could do

about it. I often criend to my mother, asking when it would stop. It took another couple of years for doctor's to find the correct medication for me. I realize that, for me, it's about not allowing any type of 'affliction' to interfere with your life, how I've not only overcome, but also excelled in many of the things I wanted to accomplish for my life, and it's not over!
